This letter is in reply to your request for information pursuant to the *Access to Information Act* (the Act) for:

"I would like records regarding Indigenous communities an i their use of the Canada Child Benefit, (include emails sent to or prepared by the Assistant Commissioner, notes and other documents that include discussion on the matter, only final draft required). Also include data or statistics on the total amounts directed to this specific group.

Timeframe is from September 6, 2017 to June 12, 2018.

Please exclude material considered to be matters of cabinet confidence, or subject to thirdparty consultations (this includes other government departments and agencies)."

We have enclosed a copy of the requested information. When you review the documents, you will note some shaded areas where the information has been removed in accordance with subsections 24(1) and 68(a), and paragraphs 10(2)(c) and 21(1)(b) of the Act.

Officials from the Strategy and Integration Branch have advised that:

The deck "Measuring tax-filing amongst Indigenous peoples: update Key findings from the 2015 tax year" provides an overview of the project's key findings. Minor errors were noted in the documents, and we are providing the corrected version below:

- Slide 4: There are 822 populated reserves in Canada, not 882.
- Slides 8 and 9: The map titles indicate these are linkage rates for individuals aged 19+; however, the results reflected are for individuals aged 15+.

In addition, please note the following:

- Slide 13: The numbers on this slide are correct. However, they differ from the numbers provided in the briefing note for the following reasons:
- The briefing note provides the linkage rate for families with children under the age of 18, within a certain income threshold (less than \$150,000).

• Slide 13 in the accompanying deck provides the linkage rate for all families with children under the age of 18, regardless of household income. The linkage rate for on-reserve families remains the same, whether an income cut-off is applied or not (79%). However, for families in Canada, the number for all families with children under the age of 18, as outlined on this slide, is 91%. When applying an income threshold, as in the briefing note, the number is 92%. Similarly, for families in Inuit Nunangat, the number increases from 85% to 86% for families when this income threshold is applied.

Indigenous Peoples' access to be nefits and credits through the tax system

Ministe rial Briefing February 26, 2018

Purp o se


- To provide an overview of the challenges in Indigenous Peoples' access to benefits and credits available through the tax system.
- To review steps taken to date by the CRA and partners.
- To identify next steps.
- To situate this ongoing work within the upcoming CRA Indigenous Strategy.

Challenges in Benefit Access

- Filing a tax return is the key to unlocking benefits and credits administered through the tax system, as well as income-tested programs (e.g., Old Age Security).
- In 2014, at the request of Aboriginal Affairs and Northern Development Canada*, the CRA produced a preliminary estimate of on-reserve tax-filing rates, suggesting rates as low as 50%. However, initial data sources were poor.
- Reasons for low Indigenous filing were not clear, but seemed likely to include a mix of:
 - Aware ne ss;
 - Perceived or real complexity;
 - Community remoteness (e.g., telecommunications access);
 - · Lack of local capacity; and,
 - Historical resistance to participation in the tax system.
- Poordata quality and lack of understanding of root causes hindered efforts to improve benefit up take in the Indigenous population.

Steps taken to data to promote Indigenous access to be nefits

Three-pronged approach:



Re se arch & data Better understanding filing rates issues

Public Opinion Research

- In 2016-2017, we launched two public opinion research studies (one with onreserve populations, and one with vulnerable populations, including urban Indigenous peoples), to improve our understanding of barriers to tax-filing.
- Key findings included:
 - Aware ness of bene fits and credits is uneven;
 - Complexity of tax filing and costs are seen as a significant barrier;
 - · Individuals prefer to use a tax preparer over self-filing.

Re se arch & data Measuring the size of the issue

Linkage rate project

- As a proxy we use the rate at which individuals who participated in the Census (2016) can be linked to a tax return for the nearest tax year (2015). Key findings include:
 - There is a gap between the linkage rates of Indigenous and non-Indigenous individuals: 83% compared to 91%. However, this gap is significantly smaller than previously estimated.
 - The gap is largest among the on-reserve population:
 - Indigenous peoples on-reserve: 75%
 - Indigenous peoples off-reserve: 85%
 - Indigenous peoples in Inuit Nunangat*: 85%
 - The gap is smallest among families which may be eligible for the CCB.
 - Families across Canada: 92%
 - Families on-reserve: 79%
 - Families in Inuit Nunangat: 86%
 - The rates vary widely across Indigenous communities, from 33% to 97%.

^{*}Inuit Nunangat includes four regions: Nunatsiavut (Northern coastal Labrador), Nunavik (Northern Quebec), the territory of Nunavut, and the Inuvialuit region of the Northwest Territories. Nearly three-quarters of Inuit reside in these regions.

Re search & data Measuring the size of the issue (continued)

- The se results are also from 2015 a year before the launch of the CCB, and prior to the significant joint efforts of CRA, ESDC, and Service Canada, to promote benefit up take in Indigenous communities.
- The results to date establish a base line to measure our impact in future years and monitor the situation.
- They also help us understand the scope of the issue and better target our various activities.
- Statistics Canada is now exploring more detailed analysis of the CCB administrative file, to further refine analysis of CCB-up take on-reserve.

Partne rships

Fostering collaboration

- Continuous, active collaboration with key federal partners:
 - Statistics Canada (Statscan) to help assess Indigenous filing rate
 - Employment and Social Development Canada (ESDC) CCB "owner"
 - Service Canada (SC) outreach and information dissemination partner
 - Department of Indigenous Services Canada (DISC) regionally active in joint outreach visits

Developing a common vision

- In September 2017, the CRA launched an inter-departmental working group to review and apply the findings of research projects undertaken to-date, including: the two public opinion research studies, and the Statscan-led linkage rates project to establish a base line for measuring Indigenous tax-filing.
- To gether, officials have reviewed the findings from these projects and identified five key themes: knowledge of benefits and credits; awareness of and access to support; perceptions of complexity of the filing system; interfacing with the government; and, addressing unique challenges and community capacity.
- The working group is in the process of identifying interdepartmental initiatives to address specific issues identified through this process.

Partnerships (continued)

Engaging Indigenous Organizations

- In the coming weeks, the CRA and ESDC will engage national Indigenous organizations to share the results of these research projects, and seek their views on what could be done to address the identified issues. These organizations include:
 - Assembly of First Nations;
 - Inuit Tapiriit Kanatami;
 - Mé tis Na tio na l Co unc il;
 - AFOA Canada; and,
 - Na tio na l Asso c ia tio n o f Frie nd ship Centre s.

Building new partnerships

- We are also communicating results from our research projects with provincial and territorial governments, through bilateral Senior Management Committee meetings, and exploring potential opportunities for further collaboration.
- We continue to build strategic partnerships with non-governmental organizations to promote shared messages(e.g., Prosper Canada), or support program de livery (e.g., Chartered Professional Accountants of Canada for the CVIIP).

Aware ness & Education: Indigenous Community Outreach

Building relationships

- Jointly with Service Canada (SC), visited to date 625 of the 698 communities identified by SC to increase awareness and uptake of the Canada child benefit (CCB), and other benefits and credits available through the tax and benefit system.
- Launched a redesigned outreach and partnerships database to better track and report on outreach activities and partnerships.

Increasing community capacity and make it easier to obtain benefits and file taxes

- Simplify the CCB application process by, for example, simplifying the application form.
- Implement the Automated Benefits Application (ABA) in Yukon and the Northwest Territories.
- Make it easier to file tax returns, for example with the simplified TISD, and use results from research projects and public opinion research to focus outreach efforts.
- Launched with SC a journey mapping project to better understand the challenges affecting applying for and the up take of the CCB.

Aware ne ss & Educ a tion:

Strong program results to date

- Doubled the number of organizations holding clinics on reserves from 97 to 193.
- Recruited 116 new organizations (urban/on-reserve) serving Indigenous clients.
- Increased the number of Indigenous-focused organizations taking part including a 50% increase in Northern Canada.

Enhancing services

- Built and strengthened partnerships to further expand reach into remote and under-serviced locations (e.g., Partnerships with the Chartered Professional Accountants organizations).
- Leveraged technology to make filing easier (Auto-fill my return for CVIIP volunteers) and enhanced the online volunteer registration system.
- Developed an Action Plan in response to an ethnographic study on homeless individuals, including Indigenous, to enhance CVIIP services and access to be nefits.

Communications initiatives

- A tax and benefit webinar specific to Indigenous peoples (March 21, 2018)
- Partnership with the Aboriginal Peoples Television Network to co-create photos for the Agency to use with tailored communication products
- A digital advertising campaign (\$200K) was launched mid-February 2018 (for six weeks) to promote benefits and credits, especially the Canada child benefit to Indigenous peoples.



- Tax time communication products:
 - Includes tailored tax tips, web content and social media messaging for an Indigenous audience
 - Working with the Department of Indigenous Services Canada to distribute content during tax season
 - File my re turn servic e

De ve lopment of an Indigenous Strategy

- The CRA is developing a **high-level framework** to outline our responsibilities and objectives related to the CRA's broader Indigenous portfolio. The Strategy's focus will be broader than our efforts to promote benefit up take, though that remains a key component of our work.
- The CRA interacts with Indigenous individuals and entities in **three distinct** capacities, and the strategy will hold a commitment for each:
 - Taxfilers: Individuals, businesses, and governments who have an obligation to participate in the tax system, or would be nefit from doing so
 - Beneficiaries: Individuals who are entitled to benefits, credits, or programs that are income-tested and require participation in the tax system.
 - Clients: Indigenous governments, on behalf of whom the CRA administers, collects, and enforces taxes
- We will share the document with our federal partners and seek input from national Indigenous organizations on our direction before finalizing.
- The Strategy will be supplemented by a tactical Action Plan, similar to those developed in 2016-2017, and 2018-2019. This will include concrete actions, that could potentially be publically communicated.

AC Backgrounder - Indigenous Service

February 22, 2018

Service Canada Indigenous Outreach Partnership:

Service Canada (SC) and the CRA are collaborating to increase awareness and uptake of the Canada child benefit and other benefits available to Indigenous people on-Reserve and in Northern Communities. SC connected with 698 Indigenous communities to arrange in-person outreach visits and as of January 31, 2018, CRA and SC had provided outreach to 625 of these communities (with 65 declining outreach and 8 more visits being planned).

Simplifying the CCB Application Process:

The CCB application form is being modified to make it easier to understand; the revised application will be available in July 2018. We are also working on a checklist to guide clients through the application process and a Q&A document to help clients understand certain areas that have caused confusion in the past (e.g., marital status, shared custody, determination of the primary caregiver, etc.). The checklist and Q&A documents will be made available to band councils and CVITP volunteers as reference materials when helping clients. It is also our intent to make them available in multiple Indigenous languages.

Redesigned Outreach and Partnerships Database:

The Outreach and Partnerships Database is a horizontally-shared reporting tool for capturing CRA outreach activities to vulnerable populations throughout Canada. The tool aids in coordinating regional outreach goals and programs, planning regional events and activities, identifying priority audiences, and in delivery of regional activities and events. It allows for a central repository to record and report activities, evaluate effectiveness of individual events, and to share outreach statistics with senior management and the Minister.

The T1S-D Pilot:

The T1S-D Credit and Benefit Return has been redesigned and simplified into a questionnaire/tick-box style for registered Indians or persons entitled to be registered under the Indian Act with certain types of income. This simplified T1S-D will be piloted in Saskatchewan and Newfoundland and Labrador throughout the 2017 tax filing year (February to December 2018). The other provinces with an existing T1S-D will continue to use their regular T1S-D returns. Band offices can call the CRA to request the T1S-D return, as they are not available online. The CRA will also provide copies to the Regional Outreach Programs Officers (ROPOS) to distribute during their Outreach activities, and also to CVITP volunteers who help Indigenous people complete paper returns.

CPA Partnership and Pilots:

In summer 2017, CVITP engaged CPA Canada and the provincial CPA chapters in Ontario, Alberta, and British Columbia (BC) to explore areas of current and future collaboration. The objective of this work is to identify and eliminate any perceived barriers to the participation of CPAs in the volunteering through

the CVITP; and to increase the number of CPA volunteers. Based on current figures, the number of CPA volunteers have increased compared to last year.

The CVITP and CPA Ontario piloted a training package for CPAs to facilitate their volunteer participation for the upcoming tax season. Going forward, CVITP will support CPA organizations by tracking the contribution of their volunteers.

The CVITP reached agreements with CPA-BC, CPA-Ontario, and CPA-Alberta to pilot tax preparation clinics run primarily by CPA's in remote and northern communities during the spring of 2018. The objective of these pilots is to enhance outreach and CVITP efforts in the North.

Journey Mapping:

Through CRA's partnership with Employment and Social Development Canada (ESDC), and as part of the joint effort to increase the uptake of the Canada child benefit (CCB) with Service Canada, we are collaborating on a journey mapping effort to map and analyze the user experience of CCB recipients, for Indigenous people, and address challenges.

The objective of journey mapping is to better understand the path and channels current and prospective benefit recipients take to receive benefits and credits, such as the CCB, with the aim of serving them better. This initiative will better position BPD to make process improvements and to forecast future benefit recipient needs. Journey mapping results can also provide insights into the behavior of benefit recipients, which can be leveraged to better target our outreach and communication efforts. More generally, this initiative will build journey mapping capacity within the branch and BPD will share results and best practices within the CRA once complete.

Ethnography Study:

In March and April of 2017, the Accelerated Business Solutions Lab ("the Lab") at the CRA conducted an ethnographic study at shelters in Ottawa. This study sought to understand the experiences that homeless and housing-insecure Canadians have filing taxes and accessing benefits, particularly through the CVITP.

The study identified key barriers to tax-filing for people who are homeless or house-insecure. Although this report does not give explicit recommendations, it offers potential directions for the CRA to consider. The CVITP has developed an action plan to address related implications. This action plan will form part of the strategy to reach and support vulnerable Canadians-CVITP and Outreach 2018-2019 to 2020-2021.

Indigenous webinar:

The webinar, to be held on March 21, 2018, will present benefits and credits to an Indigenous audience. It will be promoted through Indigenous stakeholder organizations such as Friendship Centres and Indigenous Services Canada. The webinar is a new initiative by the CRA to reach out to Indigenous people. The webinar will be used to gauge interest in this format of communicating benefit and credit information.

Speaking notes for Frank Vermaeten Ministerial briefing February 26, 2018 - Engagement with Indigenous Populations

SLIDE 3: AWARENESS & EDUCATION: INDIGENOUS COMMUNITY OUTREACH

2017: Building relationships

- We have made great strides with Service Canada in reaching out to Indigenous communities – to date 625 communities have been visited with positive results.
 - Of the total communities contacted, 65 declined outreach visits and 8 more visits are planned in the near-future.
 - Collaboration with Service Canada will continue into 2018-2019.
- Developed a new outreach database for CRA program areas to support outreach efforts and to better track visits.

2017-2018: Increase community capacity and make it easier to obtain benefits and file taxes

- The CCB application form is being modified to make it easier to understand; the revised application will be available in July 2018.
- The Automated Benefits Application (ABA):
 - The agreement with NWT is complete and we're targeting the system implementation by end of this fiscal year.
 - Yukon should follow shortly thereafter (Spring 2018) they are reviewing the MOU.
 - Nunavut We are in joint discussions with Nunavut, Service Canada and Statistics Canada to get Nunavut on the National Routing System, a requirement for adopting ABA. At this time there is no timetable for implementation.
- We are also simplifying the T1S-D form for Status Indians to make it easier to file a tax return.
 - NFLD and Labrador and Saskatchewan will use this form for the 2018 tax filing season.
 - The regular T1S-D form will continue to be available for the four remaining provinces that use the T1S-D.
- The CRA is focused on gathering better data on its vulnerable populations to provide more effective and efficient services.
 - We are using insights from two public opinion research studies; one on Indigenous peoples and one on general vulnerable populations; an ethnography study focused on shelter users and the Office of the Taxpayer's Ombudsman's

- systematic review on homeless and housing-insecure individuals (which also included Indigenous input) to explore ways to make tax filing easier.
- Many of the same observations were made in separate studies.
- The journey mapping project will look at the CCB application process from the client perspective to learn about their experiences, challenges, pain points, and how the process can ultimately be enhanced.
 - o Focus is on the Indigenous peoples experience to increase uptake of the CCB.

SLIDE 4: AWARENESS & EDUCATION: CVITP

- The CVITP demonstrated strong results in 2017, as demonstrated through the figures on this slide.
 - The program is on track to have a successful filing season in 2018 and working hard to retain participating organizations from last year and in recruiting new organizations.
 - Early results indicate that the number of participating organizations and their volunteers will exceed that of last year.
- The CVITP has engaged with Chartered Professional Accountants Canada and provincial chapters to increase the number of CPA volunteers in the CVITP and to leverage CPAs to run CVITP clinics in remote Indigenous communities.
- Auto-fill My Return pilot: This year it is being phased in with 1,200 volunteers.
- An ethnographic study was conducted by SIB's Accelerated Business Solutions Lab in 2017 that sought to understand the experiences that homeless Canadians have filing taxes and accessing benefits, particularly through the CVITP.
 - The CVITP developed an action plan to respond to the recommendations of the study.

SLIDE 5: AWARENESS & EDUCATION: COMMUNICATIONS

- The CRA is working on a number of communications initiatives and products targeting the Indigenous population, including:
 - o A tax and benefit webinar specific to Indigenous peoples on March 21, 2018.
 - An online advertising campaign to promote benefits and credits to Indigenous peoples, focusing on the Canada child benefit.
 - And general filing season communication products like tax tips and social media content.

• Today we celebrate the one year anniversary of the implementation of the Canada child benefit (CCB). In this new benefit year under the new CCB program, we successfully issued CCB payments totalling \$25 billion to 3.6 million families.

- The implementation was no small achievement. It required incredible effort, beginning with teams putting in place the actual program, working through the issues and problems that came up, to finally working with our Tax Centres to process the new applications. Thanks to the tremendous effort of our BPD staff in Headquarters and in the Regions, we were able to provide a very smooth transition to the new program.
- Our work in Benefit Programs Directorate makes a real impact on the lives of families with children.
- But we can also say that BPD is a very important part of every Canadian's day to day life, not only for the benefits we administer, but also for the work we manage through TRIS, IDENT, and the many federal and provincial/territorial datafeeds we administer.
- BPD has also taken on the challenge of managing the workloads for CVITP and Outreach. As
 one of the Minister's priorities in her mandate, she is committed to increasing the awareness of
 benefit programs in the indigenous community in Canada to ensure that every Canadian is
 receiving the benefits for which they might be entitled and ensuring that Canadians are able to
 file their returns in order to receive their benefit entitlements.
- Through the efforts of 16,500 CVITP volunteers and 2,885 community organizations, the CRA was able to provide assistance to Canadians in completing 765,000 income tax and benefit returns in 2016-2017
- BPD is also developing in the area of business intelligence and analytics. Through this
 work, we will be able to create better marketing and communications tools to reach out to
 even more Canadians
- The work undertaken in BPD is diverse and challenging, but the impact it has on the people we serve it extremely important. We can be very proud of all our accomplishments, and all of your efforts in the work that you do is very much appreciated.
